

Seal Script Stamp

Seal script developed directly from China's most ancient forms of writing. Create your own seal script stamp and use it to "sign" a decorated postcard.

DURATION

45 minutes - 1 hour

MATERIALS

FOR THE SEAL STAMP

Pencil

Seal script practice sheet

1-inch-square piece of craft foam or thick cardboard

An old building block or Lego brick Glue

FOR THE POSTCARD

Cardstock cut into 4 × 6-inch postcards

Drawing and coloring implements

Pen or a pencil


Inkpad

Address of someone you'd like to

Postage stamp

PROCEDURE



After finishing the sheet, look over the characters and note:

Do some of the characters resemble the objects or ideas they represent?

Which ones?

How?




PROCEDURE



- Choose a favorite character from the practice sheet to create your own seal. It could be:
 - a character you think represents you,
 - · a character you find visually pleasing,
 - · or a character that brings up a good memory.
- For example, here is the character for "fire" etched into a foam square with a pencil. If you don't have foam, you can use a piece of thick cardboard.

Note: If your chosen character isn't symmetrical, you need to etch it backwards on the foam. That way, when you use it as a stamp, the character will read correctly.




Glue the foam square onto a small wooden block or a Lego brick. Now it's ready to be used with the stamp pad.



A piece of blank cardstock can be decorated to become a postcard.

Draw and color in a landscape, a portrait, or a design on this side of the card. Then use the stamp and inkpad to "sign" your artwork.
